1. Announcements

Welcome to Lis Leonard!

Updates on SRLF deposits: We are at 54% of our allocation. (Thanks Ryan!) Between July 1, 2003 and April 1, 2004, UCSD deposited 11,932 of our 22,000 requested number of volumes. Ryan is stockpiling items at the Annex to send when SRLF re-opens.

IR/PS would like to move their 20,000 volumes in the Annex to SRLF and move another 20,000 volumes from IR/PS to the Annex. Ryan indicated that there are CJK language and workflow issues, but that titles in Roman or Cyrillic scripts could be dealt with. IR/PS will work with their designated liaison in the Catalog Department.

JSTOR holdings update (Harold):

We now have three new collections: Arts & Sciences III and IV, and the Arts & Sciences Complement. The JSTOR news that Harold sends out does not mean we have immediate access to content. We still have to wait for the CDL licensing process and shared cataloging to happen before we have access to new content. As of May 2004, we are up to date. Quality color images are also available for many of the art journals in the Arts & Sciences III collection. We have opened this meeting up to the UC art librarians and ARLIS/NA & Cal chapter, and VRA & Cal chapter. Of course interested UCSD librarians and staff may also attend. We'll send out an email soon.

2. Serials format migration and next steps

We are looking at a 7.5% cut in 2004/05.

The SSH Cluster is adopting a two-pronged approach to meeting this cut:

- 1) Cancellation of print content that is duplicated electronically. Savings will revert to the serials pot to cover future price increases.
- 2) Review and cancellation of print standing orders. Savings will revert back to the subject monographic pot for bibliographers to use

For the first, this will be an ongoing activity, package by package, or vendor by vendor. We will be able to continue print subscriptions of up to 5% to titles that are part of the shared print archive. We will give Stacy a list of any titles we wish to continue in print **by July 31**.

Shared print archive at SRLF soon to be in place:

APA PsycArticles (January 2006). Three campuses (UCB, UCSC, UCLA) have committed to subscribe to print titles through the end of 2005 in order to maintain system-wide access to content **[distributed title list, as “fyi”]**

Shared print archives currently, or soon to be, under negotiation:

Springer

Oxford

Cambridge

CDL has subscribed to *Education Full Text* via WilsonWeb. This is an aggregator database, and titles are not part of a shared print archive. Titles fall into a number of subject areas within the social sciences and humanities, and individual bibliographers should take this opportunity to review and identify titles for cancellation. We should give Stacy any titles to cancel **by July 31** **[distributed list as action item]**

3. Standing order review and cancellation

Announcement of **standing orders** review and cancellation, with an **August 31** deadline. I distributed title lists by fund several months ago during the serials cancellation project. Let me know if you would like me to send you another copy.

- Look at volumes in the Stacks to ascertain evidence of use
- See if titles are (still) needed to support current research activity
- People may choose to convert STOs to slips, although this will result in workload increases in the Acquisition Department.

4. “New items” lists in Roger

We discussed the utility of these lists, many of which have become quite “stale.” Bibliographers indicated that these are useful, and that we would like to have lists generated systematically and automatically. Ryan and Tony said that it may be possible to request an Innopac enhancement or eventually use MyMilleneum for patrons to generate lists based on specific criteria themselves. Discussion of this topic will continue.
